PUREBRED ARABIAN HORSE NOMINEES

AFIRES ROYALTY+//

Henry is absolutely thrilled and humbled to be nominated as Region 14 Horse of the Year. At 18 years of age, Henry had an exceptionally busy year which he proudly boasts normally could have only been handled by a horse half his age. With the ever so talented Leah Beth Golladay at the reins, Henry was the 2024 Unanimous Midsummer Show Hack National Champion in a stunningly beautiful class filled with National Champions. They also were 2024 US National Top Ten in both Arabian Show Hack Open and Arabian Ladies Side Saddle Open, overcoming a thrown shoe that took off a huge chunk of his foot in the first few minutes of the SF/F of the Arabian Show Hack Open, having placed second in their Section. Despite his foot being wrapped (to keep the shoe on because of the missing chunk of foot) with so much tape that it looked comically oversized, and that almost with his first stride the tape started to unravel (with no ability to call another time out without being disqualified), Henry performed all gates with balance and precision completely unfazed and was awarded a US National Top Ten in the deeply competitive class.

With his "person" of the past four years, Susan Racey (at least she thinks she is), Henry was 2024 Midsummer Native Costume AAOTR Reserve National Champion and Arabian Country Pleasure AATR Choice Top Ten (third) as well as 2024 US National Top Ten in Arabian Side Saddle AAOTR and Arabian Native Costume AAOTR. Henry is very proud that he was at least Top Ten in every National class and at least Top Five in every Regional class in which he competed in 2024. Beyond the victory passes, Henry's joyful spirit and determination to always "do it right" truly shines through during every show, making the experience a blast for everyone involved.

However, Henry's proudest moment in 2024, was the birth of his first child, the gorgeous Henrietta RA, out of the exceptional Mare, Luv Me Do (Aftershoc X Miss Allience). Since her birth, Henry has been telling anyone who will listen "I told you so" and thinks that we would all be fools to not breed him on a regular basis. Henry sees himself as just your typical Arabian stallion: extraordinarily beautiful, smart, versatile, strong, loyal and charming.

In his spare time, Henry loves giving riding lessons to up and coming stars of the future, like Miss Olivia Golladay and Miss Tessa Phillips. For all of his hard work, Henry only asks (demands) his weekly trail ride and an endless amount of peppermints.

While Henry is incredibly proud of his nomination and wants to express his gratitude for the recognition, he also hopes to keep the family spirit alive; if he doesn't clinch the title, he

secretly wishes (at least sort of) for his younger brother Skyfire to take home the honors instead. Regardless of the outcome, Henry is proud of his accomplishments and excited for what the future holds as he hoping to add appearances in the Select and Youth divisions in 2025

What discipline(s) does your horse show in during 2024 –How many years have you been competing with your horse? If you did not show, what events were you involved in?

Sport Horse Under Saddle and Sport Horse Show Hack, shown by the family since he was 5 years old starting out with a very successful Hunter Pleasure career before switching to Sport Horse Under Saddle.

Tell us about you and your horse's accomplishments and honors you have achieved together in 2024?

2024 Sport Horse Nationals: Top Ten in Show Hack ATR and Sport Horse Under Saddle AOTR Jackpot.

With ISABELLE MACLAREN in Sport Horse Under Saddle Walk-Trot, Remy and Isabelle received 4 Regional Championships, being undefeated at all regionals attended (13, 15 and 16).

With LUCY MACLAREN in Sport Horse Under Saddle JTR, Remy and Lucy received 3 Top Fives.

With Jackie MacLaren in Sport Horse Show Hack, Remy and Jackie received 1 Regional Championship and 2 Reserve National Championships.

For a 2024 total of 5 Regional Champions, 2 Reserve Champions, and 3 Top Fives. In addition to showing in 2024, Remy goes on trail rides and attended the local county fair and showed with Isabelle in 4-H Walk-Trot classes, receiving a First Place in both Pleasure and Equitation. As one of a very few Arabians that appear at the county fair, Remy has been a standout ambassador showing what the breed can accomplish with young riders.

What, if any, obstacles have you or your horse encountered during your competition or outreach efforts?

Doing walk trot classes were new for Remy in 2023, and he really came into his own with Isabelle in 2024 in learning to help a young rider around the arena.

What makes your horse special to you, and what plans do you have for your horse in the future?

Having bred, raised, trained and shown by the family, Remy is truly a family horse living at home and being shown by the whole family. Isabelle has claimed Remy as her heart horse and the bond that they share is special.

What discipline(s) does your horse show in during 2024 –How many years have you been competing with your horse? If you did not show, what events were you involved in?

Groovin showed some sport horse show hack classes and one sport horse under saddle class but showed mostly in the dressage ring.

Tell us about you and your horse's accomplishments and honors you have achieved together in 2024?

Groovin's accomplishments for 2024:

What, if any, obstacles have you or your horse encountered during your competition or outreach efforts?

2024 was Groovin's return to the show ring after almost a 2 year hiatus due to two different injuries. You never know when you are bringing a horse back after that long if they will be on top of their game and come back just as strong as they were before the injuries. I only showed Groovin in third and fourth level this year due to him still needing to gain a lot more strength to show the FEI levels. I didn't want to push to hard to fast and risk injury. Groovin came back better then ever and it was definitely a year to remember.

What makes your horse special to you, and what plans do you have for your horse in the future?

Groovin is the type of horse that will leave a mark on my heart for the rest of my life. He is the little horse that can and proves that size doesn't matter. Not only does he compete and win at the arab shows but he competes on the open USDF circuit where he continues his winning ways. He is that ride or die type of horse. I'm currently working on all the Grand Prix movements with Groovin. So the big goal is to ride down centerline in the Grand Prix with him in the future maybe the 2026 show season. This year the goal is to return the FEI ring and show the Prix St George and Intermediate 1.

Rocco is a true all-rounder, competing in a variety of disciplines including Hunter Pleasure, Dressage, Sport Horse Under Saddle, Sport Horse In-Hand, Side Saddle, and Hunt Seat Equitation!

Tell us about you and your horse's accomplishments and honors you have achieved together in 2024?

What, if any, obstacles have you or your horse encountered during your competition or outreach efforts in 2024?

Matthew has a habit of getting injured. On the eve of heading to the Ohio State Fair for the Jr. Fair Horse Show, he decided to get hurt in his stall which earned him a month of stall rest to recoup in the height of summer horse shows. Like the trooper he is, Matthew came back with less than a week of riding to earn his almost clean sweep during county fair, while being the only Arabian showing in western and ranch related classes.

What makes your horse special to you, and what plans do you have for your horse in the future?

What discipline(s) does your horse show in during 2024 –How many years have you been competing with your horse? If you did not compete, which events or outreach was your horse involved with?

I have had Hometown Girl++++// aka Reba since she was born. I am the proud breeder of this wonderful mare. I have been competing her since she was a yearling. Reba competes in sport horse in hand and under saddle but spends most of her time in the dressage ring.

Tell us about you and your horse's accomplishments and honors you have achieved together in 2024?

Reba had a very successful show season 2024:

Stonehurst Show - First places in sport horse in hand, sport horse under saddle and won her second level debut in second level

Region 13 - Champion sport horse in hand ATH, under saddle AOTR, second level ATR

- Reserve Champion second level AOTR
- Supreme Champion half arabian sport horse in hand

Region 14- Champion - sport horse in hand ATH and open, Top five training level ATR SHN - National Champion Sport in Hand Mares Dressage Type Open

- -National Champion dressage training level AAOTR
- -National Top Ten First Level AAOTR (5th), First Level open (4th), Training Level ATR (3rd), Sport in hand mares dressage type ATH (5th)

One of the highlights of the season though was watching Reba help make a little 13 year old girls dream come true. In June, I answered an ISO ad on facebook. A parent was looking for a horse that their daughter could possibly show at SHN. I offered Reba for sport horse in hand. Bailey and her mother were going to be at Region 14 so I told them Bailey could show her at 14 for practice before SHN. Bailey showed Reba to a Championship in the ATH SHIH class which was her first championship win at the regional level. Next came SHN and Reba helped Bailey earn her first National placing, a top ten (5th) in SHIH ATH. I

loved watching Reba show Bailey the ropes of sport horse in hand and the connection she had with Bailey. This was the first time that Reba had ever been handled by a kid and she never put a foot wrong. It was an amazing moment watching my horse that I bred help a little girls dream come true.

What, if any, obstacles have you or your horse encountered during your competition or outreach efforts in 2024?

In 2024 we had set backs due to saddle fit. We started off the spring strong winning her debut in second level at the Stonehurst show. From there we to Region 13 where we had successful show but problems started with saddle fit. A new saddle had been ordered for her in March and we were having some major delays and unexpected situations that keep the saddle delayed for months. After Region 13, Reba had to have time off being ridden because the saddle was causing issues. The saddle arrived right before Region 14 which left a only a couple weeks to prep before SHN. After only a couple weeks back into work Reba was able to have a very successful SHN.

What makes your horse special to you, and what plans do you have for your horse in the future?

Reba is special to me because she is the first horse that I have bred. There is definitely a special connection when you bred them, raise them, train them and also show them. I plan on continuing Reba's training up the levels in dressage. We plan on showing second level seriously this year and will hopefully be working on polishing up third level this year so we can be ready to show third in 2026

What discipline(s) does your horse show in during 2024 –How many years have you been competing with your horse? If you did not compete, which events or outreach was your horse involved with?

We primarily showed halter and sport horse in hand, but we started our under saddle career in 2024. We showed sport horse under saddle and training level dressage. She has been shown since she was 5 months old.

Tell us about you and your horse's accomplishments and honors you have achieved together in 2024?

This year was pretty special! We've shown her in hand for a couple of years, though this year we took supreme sport horse in hand at two different shows! We also showed under saddle, which we ended the season showing training level dressage for two 3rd place finishes and a score of 64% for both! What makes your horse special to you, and what plans do you have for your horse in the future?

She's extremely special to me as she is my first homebred. I'm not a breeder, and the original goal for her was to just be a bigger version of her mom for trail riding. When she was born, she showed way too much potential to have her be just a trail horse (though we trail ride a lot anyway!), so we decided to direct her toward showing. For 2025, we're aiming for SHN and hoping to do well at training level and in the dressage prospect class! Regardless of how she does, she's always going to be special to us!

What farm(s) are you associated with and what is your primary duties with Arabian/Half Arabian horses?

IIB Farms

How do you see yourself as being helpful not only as a groom at events, but in other helpful ways?

Being a groom is so much more than tacking and prepping horses. I'm your cheerleader, photographer, water bottle holder, you name it! And yes, I'm always gonna give your horse extra treats!

What are your roles that go beyond grooming, but may be helpful behind the scenes?

Being a groom means you jump in anywhere you are needed. That may mean cleaning stalls, helping riders get organized, making sure the tack has an extra minute of shining, etc. There are so many moving parts when it comes to making sure both horse and rider are beautiful and confident going in to the arena, and my job is to do whatever it takes to make that happen!

What enjoyment do you get being in a supportive role? What is your sense of accomplishment?

As a show groom, you basically get adopted into a barn family during the show. You get to know the horses and the clients. Do you do your own work with your horse(s), or do you work with a sport horse instructor? Do you consider yourself an Amateur or a Professional in the Sport Horse & Dressage area of competition?

I'm an amateur owner who keeps my horses at home. I do all my own training and riding. I do take lessons from a dressage trainer.

How many years have you been involved with horses, and, in particular in the Sport Horse & Dressage divisions?

I have been involved with horses my entire life, my mom had Arabians when I was born. I have been riding sport horse and dressage since 2007.

What are your accomplishments in the Sport Horse & Dressage divisions from 2024?

I showed my 3 personal horses this year in sport horse and dressage (2 of the horses I bred myself). My homebred yearling showed at her first show and ended up winning Half-Arabian supreme sport horse in hand at the Sahiba show. Region 13, I took two horses and we came home with 4 regional championships, 1 reserve championship and 2 top fives. My mare, Hometown Girl also ended up winning the half arabian sport horse in hand supreme championship. I had the honor of showing Ruby Soleil in sport horse hand where we came away with a reserve regional championship. In July, I attended the National Dressage Pony Cup with Groovin where we won the fourth level amateur small horse division. We also won the High Score Arabian Sport Horse Alliance award awarded to the highest scoring purebred or half arabian at the show. At region 14 where I took 2 horses, we came home with 3 regional championships and 1 top five. The show of the year was Sport Horse Nationals where I took my 3 horses and had the privilege of catch handling two other

horses. I catch handled Ruby Soleil to a top ten HA sport horse in hand dressage type ATH and Ar-raqis to a Reserve championship in dressage type stallions ath and a top ten in stallions hunter type ath. My own personal horses (Groovin, Hometown Girl, and The Dancing Queen CH) came home with 4 National Championships, 2 Reserve National Championships, and 6 top tens. USEF year end awards, Groovin was National Champion in Third level amatuer, Fourth level open, fourth level amatuer and reserve national champion in third level open. For the National dressage pony cup year end awards, Groovin was Champion third level amateur and third in fourth level amatuer. It was an amazing year and couldn't have asked anymore from my horses.

What sense of accomplishment do you have as Sport Horse & Dressage exhibitor? What is your sense of fulfillment?

When you spend months (sometimes even years) working towards a certain movement in dressage and the movement finally comes together and it feels like it's so effortless it definitely gives you a big sense of accomplishment. What I love about dressage is that there are many things that can make you feel fulfilled or like you accomplished something from getting that square halt to getting your first clean line of tempi changes. It's also really fun to watch and feel how the horses development over the years.

What are your future goals and plans in the Sport Horse & Dressage division?

My future goals are to keep moving my horses up the levels. One is getting close to the Grand Prix and is currently working on the movements required for that level so a big goal is to definitely ride down centerline in the Grand Prix. I would also like to earn my gold medal in dressage.

CAITLYN LAUER

Do you do your own work with your horse(s), or do you work with a sport horse instructor? Do you consider yourself an Amateur or a Professional in the Sport Horse & Dressage area of competition?

I'm primarily on my own, but I am extremely grateful I'm able to take lessons roughly once a month with my wonderfully kind and patient trainer! My trainer is strictly open dressage, but is very supportive of me in the Arabian world since she's seen this is where my people are. I'm also very much an amateur rider!

How many years have you been involved with horses, and, in particular in the Sport Horse & Dressage divisions?

I got started 24 years ago through lease horses at a dressage barn. I took a few years off for college, and then my husband bought me my first horse before we got married over 13 years ago. Which training facility do you work at or represent?

Rattner Bloodstock LLC/ Train Robbery Farm

How many years have you been training horses and what disciplines do you specialize in?

I trained my first horse in the summer of 1972. I used that income to show at the large class A shows in our area. The shows of that day were huge in entries and I could not get enough of being there to see it all. Buckeye had 2000 horses and Indianapolis almost that many. I rode any horse that someone was willing to let me ride. I groomed horses for days just to be able to ride in a class any class just so I was showing. Rick Moser was my best friend and we were so lucky to be able to work and help at Burr Hill Arabians. It was a great start for both of us. There are not many divisions that I haven't been involved with over the years. I was a saddle seat kid and rode American Saddlebreds before I started showing our Arabians. The versatility of the Arabian breed suited me more because I love all things horse. I learned to train harness horses before I could drive a car. I've ridden and shown a lot of very talented English horses many of them were horses that helped shape the Arabian breed. I've been lucky to work for the very best our breed has seen both as breeders and trainers. Varian, LaCroix, DeLongpre', Nichols and in my early years Jim Warden and James A Fisher. Dixieland, LaCoix Ltd, NDL and Colonial Wood. I've had riders who are now great trainers of today like Kellie Wendling, Crystal McNutt and Natacha Lesburgueres. The amateurs Theresa Marie Schimmel, Mia Schimmel, Rebecca Reed, Katie Pelphrey and Jennifer Schwing were so successful and talented. I've been blessed with the best all the way around. It was easy to learn with the mentors I was fortunate to work with. So much knowledge to share and we all thrived because we hung on every word. I've learned from different disciplines and instructors of different skills. The two trainers who have been the greatest influence on my work are Jim Bowman and Clarke Vesty. They are the best of any breed anytime anywhere no question. I've done this so long I could go ten more paragraphs to explain what I have learned and who I learned it from. I also learn a lot judging and watching other trainers present horses both In Hand and under saddle. After spending nine years riding with a legend like Don Harris every day I learned a few secrets about showmanship from the greatest showman to ever ride in a horse show arena.

What achievements have you accomplished personally in 2024, and what are some of the accomplishments of your clients/exhibitors in 2024?

I can't begin to explain anything about 2024 without expressing how many times we ran out of wall space for awards. Last season was one of if not the most successful that I have had in my career. One thing is for certain we won more with less horses than ever before. I've invested a great deal of my time with coaching from dressage instructors and trainers over the last twelve months.
